Pollinator Project

With two major ideas currently being implemented, it proves that the residents of Jennings County (and a few other surrounding counties) really can come together to support a good cause. That cause continues to be educating all of us about the importance of pollination, what are pollinators and how to create pollinator habitat.

The **Pollinator Potted Plant sale** ended up to be a **HUGE SUCCESS**, with over 130 customers who will be planting over 2600 plants! That means another 130 new habitat sites for butterflies, bees, moths, and all the other pollinators that serve us well.

Our Pollinator Pathway Project continues to be built as members of the pollinator committee finish up with spreading mulch over the geotextile fabric. The next move will be planting hundreds of potted flowers this May.

District Hosts Information Meeting at SEPAC

On the evening of March 31, 2016, your Soil and Water Conservation District provided a meeting about how to establish warm season grasses with forbs, how to maintain them, and what to expect over the next 5 years.

Several landowners will be adding additional forbs with CRP acres, which will create pollinator habitat, trap sediment, and uptake nutrients along field and creek edges. This will be done by installing conservation practices such as filter strips and field borders.

The meeting had 30 participants and speakers in attendance. It started with a complementary meal, an open discussion on weed control, seed rates, etc., and then headed to the shop area. With the district's Great Plains No-till drill in the shop area, Mark Bateman and Tony Eppley, of Jacobi Implements, gave a "hands on" discussion of setting the drill, depth control, gear ratios, etc. The speakers then fielded any specific questions drill users had.



Note: The No-till Drill rents for \$8 per acre with a \$75 minimum acre usage. We ask that when you rent it, use it and get done so we can keep it moving for the next customer.



Meredith Inman's Kindergarten Class from St. Mary's School planted a Redbud tree to celebrate Earth Day. The tree was donated by your Jennings County Soil & Water Conservation District. Several volunteers at the Developmental Service Inc. at Scipio assisted with a "hands on" workshop on how to plant wild native flowers in potted containers. The potted plants will then be donated to the City Park Pollinator Patch. Andy Ertel and Kelly Kent, District Employees delivered the program.





Spring is here and that means it's time for Soil Tests!

Sending in soil tests is one of our popular services of the district. Picture to the left is soil probes for pulling the soil samples and the soil bag that is sent in for analysis. Each sample is \$12 and the results are usually back in one week. The soil probes are free to use and return from the district. Many homeowners use the results for their yards, wildlife enthusiasts use the results for their food plots, gardeners for specific vegetable crops, and many farmers for pasture seeding and pasture improvements.

Hopefully, by now you are finished feeding hay to your livestock and they are out on the green pastures enjoying. But maybe you have created some erosion on your ground from where you did your winter feeding. Did the tractor leave some ruts or possibly some overfeeding in certain areas? If you answered yes and are interested in possibly correcting the problem you might just be in luck. If your farm is located in the Central Muscatatuck Watershed area we have cost-share available to put in heavy use area protection (HUAP) pads. You might be asking yourself what HUAPs are. A HUAP is a feeding pad that is can be either concrete or gravel. The pads are designed for livestock feeding or around a watering facility and can be scraped throughout the year. Along with the HUAP, funding is available to put in walk trails for the livestock or access roads for equipment.

The **Central Muscatatuck Watershed** Cost-Share Program will pay landowners up to 60% of your expenses for putting in conservation practices. CRP's SAFE Program is Huge Success

In Jennings County we were fortunate to have an allotment of acres in the State Acres for Wildlife Enhancement (SAFE) Program which is part of the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP). The acres we were allotted are to be planted to habitat for the Henslow Sparrow. The Henslow Sparrow is a near threatened grassland bird. In the last year, producers in Jennings County have signed up to plant, or have planted, over 435 acres in warm season grasses and legumes providing habitat for this species. This type of planting is beneficial for other types of wildlife such as rabbits, quail, turkeys and many more. In addition, 25 producers have enhanced their planting with wildflowers that will provide habitat for the native pollinators. The Jennings County SWCD received a Clean Water Indiana Grant (CWI) that provided an incentive to producers to enhance their SAFE acreage by planting a pound of wildflowers per acre. This enhancement provided over 400 acres of pollinator habitat within the wildlife habitat. With the decrease in pollinators due to habitat loss, this program was available at a perfect time. Jennings County will be a buffet for the bees and butterflies! These pollinators are crucial for our fruits and vegetables such as blueberries, melons, tomatoes and more. It's a win-win situation for our wildlife, pollinators and those of us who like to eat! Even though the program has ended, the plantings will be around for the next 10 years, providing a multitude of benefits.

Farm Service Agency Program Updates

Required Management on CRP Acres

Participants in the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) are responsible for completing required management on their CRP acreage. These management activities are separate from routine maintenance requirements and are outlined in the Conservation Plan of Operations (CPO).

Landowners must complete the necessary management activities outside of the Primary Nesting Season. In Indiana, the Primary Nesting Season for a contract that was approved for enrollment prior to February 8, 2007 has a primary nesting season of March 1 through July 15th. A contract that was approved for enrollment on or after February 8, 2007 has a primary nesting season of April 1 through August 1st.

Required management activities for grass practices include: prescribed burning, strip disking, strip spraying, inter-seeding forbs/legumes/pollinator habitat. Management practices for tree practices include: inner seedling planting, inter-seeding forbs/legumes/pollinator habitat, Invasive plant control, follow-up weed control, pruning/thinning.

When prescribed burning is identified as a management option, producers must be proactive in preventing the spread of wildfire. Fire management includes installing firebreaks, which should be included in the contract support document and installed according to NRCS firebreak standards.

The purpose of these required or Mid-Contract Management (MCM) activities is to enhance the wildlife habitat value of the enrolled acres for species such as Northern Bobwhite, pollinators, and others. In grass fields, the perennial grasses tend to crowd out desirable broadleaf plants and litter accumulates. So, a purpose of MCM is to set the perennial grasses back to enable these broadleaf plants to germinate and thrive. In tree plantings, undesirable vegetation may compete with young trees, or in older plantings, the trees may start to compete with each other and limit growth and wildlife habitat value. So a purpose of MCM is to help improve tree growth and maintain diversity—Continued on next page.

Update Your Records

FSA is cleaning up our producer record database. If you have any unreported changes of address or zip code or an incorrect name or business name on file they need to be reported to our office. Changes in your farm operation, like the addition of a farm by lease or purchase, need to be reported to our office as well. Producers participating in FSA and NRCS programs are required to timely report changes in their farming operation to the County Committee in writing and update their CCC-902 Farm Operating Plan.
